

During 2022–2024, the Nordic Council of Ministers Office in Lithuania, in collaboration with its counterparts in Latvia and Estonia, the UNHCR Representation for the Nordic and Baltic countries, and various regional stakeholders, successfully implemented the project "Fostering Refugee and Immigrant Integration" (FOR-IN). Building on this success, the initiative will continue as FOR-IN 2.0 during 2025–2026, with a more practical approach, addressing critical needs to sustain effective integration systems and advancing the concept of inclusive cities.
